
Len Wood Middle School







Percentage of Grade 10




Sense of Belonging Percentage of Grade 10





School Connectedness

- •Research has shown that young people who feel connected to their school are less likely to engage in many risk behaviors², including early sexual initiation, alcohol, tobacco and other drug use, and violence and gang involvement.
- •Students who feel connected to their school are also more likely to have better academic achievement, including higher grades and test scores, have better school attendance and stay in school longer. (Source American Psychologists Association)
- •The impact of school connectedness can be long lasting. Longitudinal studies have provided strong evidence that school connectedness can have a positive effect reaching into young adulthood, resulting in lower rates of substance use, better mental health and higher school completion rates (Monahan, 2010).
- •School connectedness is also a protective factor for early adolescent conduct problems and has been found to compensate for poor quality family relationships (Loukas, Roalson, & Herrera, 2010). Source Healthy Schools BC

School Connectedness

Connections, Conditions, Challenge, Control (4C's for engagement) — Source ASCD September 1, 2023 Edition — Douglas Fisher, Nancy Frey, Alejandro Gonzalez

- Avoid streaming students into vocational and college tracks.
- Set high academic standards.
- Limit the size of the school to create smaller learning environments.
- Ensure students have an advisor and provide mentorship.
- Connect students to their community.
- •Use a wide range of instructional methods.
- Students spending more time with their teachers.
- •Provide opportunities for students who fall behind, to catch up.




Annual Terry Fox Run
